






H20hio Progress!

Progress! With any project, progress is key! As winter shifted to spring, Crawford Construction finished the building phase of the H20hio Project at Sandusky Headwaters Preserve. After wetland construction concluded, it didn't take long for wildlife to find the captured waters. Western Chorus Frogs began chorusing; Northern Green Frogs were seen hopping from the edges; and American Toad tadpoles were found schooling along the edges. Solitary Sandpipers, with much-needed a reprieve from migration, found refuge and food in the wet meadow, and hundreds of Barn, Tree, and Roughwinged Swallows dipped and swooped



above the wetland waters, capturing scads of insects to feed any further migration flights.



While attracting wildlife is a goal with habitat improvements, incorporating a diverse mix of native plants is crucial to support the wildlife. Native plants offer host sites for caterpillars and a colorful mosaic that attracts myriad pollinators. Working with Natives in Harmony and Scioto Gardens, a plant list was formulated that would do well in saturated soils. On April 24th, 56 volunteers assisted CPD staff with planting almost 3,000 plugs! From various species of asters, lobelias, sedges, and mallows, over 50 different woody, grass, and forb species were planted. As the summer unfolds, we look forward to the color and diversity these plants will provide. Now that's progress!



Hello!


My name is Kyle Bailey, and I am the new Land Manager/Naturalist for the Crawford Park District. I bring with me nearly a decade of experience of natural resource management and outdoor natural history education. There I gained valuable experience managing for invasive species, while also contributing to a variety of flora and fauna surveys, including but not limited to the Federally Endangered Gila Monster monitoring program, the lost carnivore project, hummingbird banding, Canyon Tree Frog monitoring, breeding bird surveys, and reptile and amphibian monitoring. All these experiences have instilled in me a deep-rooted passion for conservation.





Ursa Major & The Big Dipper

The 88 constellations found in the night sky come in many different shapes and sizes and depict 42 animals, 28 objects, 14 humans, 2 chimeras, and 2 nature items. Not all of these



are visible to us in the northern hemisphere, but the largest one we can see is Ursa Major. It's also referred to as "The Great Bear" or "The Larger Bear". Even if you haven't been able to connect the stars to see Ursa Major, you have probably seen part of the bear if you've seen the Big Dipper. The Big Dipper is one of the most recognized asterisms in the night sky. The 7 bright stars (and 1 faint) are not their own constellation; instead, they are part of Ursa Major. Depending on your preferred myth, the Big Dipper makes up different parts of the bear. In some Native American tales, the bowl or ladle represents the large bear, and the stars forming the handle mark the warriors chasing after it. This legend also says in autumn when the bowl is low in the sky, it is the blood of the wounded bear that causes the leaves to turn red. In Greek mythology, the ladle of the dipper is the back end of the bear, and the handle is its tail. One Greek myth tells us that Zeus' jealous wife, Hera, turned Callisto into a bear. Years later it was Zeus that cast the bear and Arcas, Callisto's son, to the heavens forming Ursa Major and Ursa Minor (another version says he was turned into Bootes, the Herdsman). The Big Dipper



is not the only notable thing about Ursa Major. There are several beautiful galaxies and nebulas worth looking at. If you come to the Astronomy programs this summer, you'll have a chance to see some of these galaxies!

Targets for Summer

- Markarian's Chain 8 galaxies in a row, some are as far as 52 million light years away, can be found near the heart of Virgo
- ▶ M101 Also known as the Pinwheel galaxy, found in Ursa Major, has 1 trillion stars, and is 70% bigger than our Milky Way
- ▶ M104 30 million light years away is the Sombrero Galaxy; while it has a mass of 800 billion suns, the supermassive black hole in the middle of the galaxy has a mass of 1 billion suns
- M81 Found in Ursa Major, Bode's Galaxy is a spiral galaxy, 11.6 million light years away, and one of the brightest galaxies in the night sky
- M82 The Cigar Galaxy is a starburst galaxy with a high rate of star formation and is found next to Bode's Galaxy
- M51 − A spiral galaxy famous for having three supernovas since 1994 is the Whirlpool Galaxy
 M13 − The great globular cluster of Hercules has several hundred thousand stars, is 22,180
 - has several hundred thousand stars, is 22,180 light years away, and is a very pretty sight to see





A monthly blue moon is when there is a 2nd full moon in one month. A seasonal blue moon is an "extra" moon in a season; look for it on Aug. 22, 2021!

Special Thanks... The CPD would like to thank Mr. Ron Rossington for a recent donation. Josh received a phone call from Mr. Rossington regarding the usage of Sandusky Wildlife Area's (SWA) parking lot, to which the request was granted. It was used for heavy equipment parking while a contractor performed work on Mr. Rossington's property, which abuts SWA. A couple weeks later, Mr. Rossington paid Josh a visit. He thanked the CPD for allowing the use of the parking lot and explained he had some logging performed on his property. He then handed over a check for over \$15,000, the proceeds from the logging! A very special "Thank You" to Mr. Ron Rossington for not only the generous donation, but for also being a great neighbor.

Special Request... In preparation for opening Sandusky Headwaters Preserve, habitat is being improved and access is being planned. Aside from laying out a system of trails throughout the preserve, access to the "heart" of the preserve will require a set of steps. After much thought regarding navigation of foot traffic down a hill, a set of steps was deemed the appropriate course of action. (A "simple" path has a few issues, with the most significant one being erosion and mitigating that over the life of the trail.)



The set of steps will start approximately 100 yards from the parking lot and will lead down the hill to the top of the first H20hio wetland. At over 200 feet in length, there will be landings to rest and to observe the surrounding forest or to view the vista of wetland and wet meadow. The cost for the steps project will be around \$35,000. Due to fluctuating lumber prices, this cost could vary by the time of its completion.

We have had inquiries regarding how people can donate to help the CPD. To that end, we will accept donations toward the construction of steps at Sandusky Headwaters Preserve. To break down the construction, it will cost about \$1500/10ft of steps. While any donation will be accepted, those that donate \$750 or more will receive recognition via a sign or placard placed by the steps. The CPD will receive donations for the steps project until July 31.
